

Q: Why are you running for RTM?

I first joined the RTM in 2002. As an active member, I have learned the importance and value that the RTM brings to making the diverse Greenwich community stronger. On the RTM, I've successfully opposed efforts to place a commercial radio tower near NSS and a commercial intersection near GCDS. I believe my strong management skills and science and engineering background, together with my active engagement with community leaders and members can help achieve our shared goals. I will work to find efficiencies and to provide maximum benefit to town residents and the best value for our tax dollars.

Q: What are the three most important issues facing Greenwich voters today?

I think the most important issues we face are:

1. Declining public-school education: Data shows that Greenwich has dropped from being the number one district in the state to number 32, despite spending more per student than our peers, and even after accounting for diversity.
2. Environment and open space: Excessive development is out-pacing our infrastructure and I've fought against the commercialization which is creeping into our residential districts.
3. Public-private partnerships: I believe we should encourage partnerships with the private sector to help tap the deep pool of talent which is unique to Greenwich.

Among the issues facing Greenwich, three that are important are the future of the town's finances, the quality of education, and the continued reputation of Greenwich as a desirable place to live. First, while Greenwich's current financial position is sound, we face future challenges as state support disappears and Hartford attempts to push retirement obligations on the town. Second, while we have the highest education spend per student in Connecticut, we are challenged to spend more on an aging physical plant. Finally, land use and planning issues are crucial to preserving the things families seek when they move to Greenwich.
