

Q: Why are you running for RTM?



Q: Why are you running for RTM?

To represent my constituents in Cos Cob District 8 regarding any Town matters, especially land use matters, such as zoning, wetlands, property taxes. I know how the Town works, how to get things done, who to contact. I have long advocated for better Town planning and have opposed inappropriate development.

Q: What are the three most important issues facing Greenwich voters today?

(1) Traffic congestion, (2) pedestrian/bicycle safety, (3) declining population projection. Greenwich has a vast workforce that can't afford to live here, so it commutes. We are "aging in place" so few homes for young families. State is projecting 20% population drop by 2014; Downtown has already lost over 40% of its population since 1960 as Town-wide population has remained flat and household size has dwindled. Greenwich needs more senior residential options for all income levels. Traffic-calming measures have not succeeded in making our roads safe for pedestrians or bicyclists. Few parents allow their children to walk to school.

Q: Why are you running for RTM?

The RTM - one of several organizations that enable a person to become involved in the Town's life - also enables its members to make beneficial and lasting contributions for the Town's betterment. Some personal examples: negotiated the final terms securing a \$500,000 grant from SHPO for the Greenwich Point Old Barn; chaired the First Selectman's Pedestrian Safety Advisory Committee; member, committee that updated and revised budget resolutions; conferred with constituents, Town agencies and Town Attorney to propose and finalize legislation on senior tax relief and other issues; assisted Appointments Committee Chair in reorganizing Town-wide appointments schedule.

Q: What are the three most important issues facing Greenwich voters today?

Work Force Housing: Eliminating the shortage of affordable work force housing would have many benefits, including reducing traffic congestion by reducing the concentration of commuters and allowing Town agencies to retain experienced teachers and first responders.

Senior Population: Many studies show Greenwich's senior population increasing, and Greenwich is the first Connecticut town named Age/Dementia Friendly. The RTM needs to support these continuing developments.

Schools: The Board of Education has the greatest share of the Town budget with an upcoming multi-hundred million dollar capital budget. The condition of school playing fields is of urgent concern.

Greenwich is a wonderful town, but with 60,000 residents and ~70 square miles, it can sometimes feel like a city. Our 230 member legislative body - the RTM - can also seem difficult to navigate. When I was elected in 2017, I vowed to change that. I took to my RTM Facebook page to publicize issues that affected our town and solicited constituent feedback via social media, something that was virtually unheard of. I believe government should be accessible to all and I plan to continue to make myself and the RTM accessible, accountable and transparent to all Greenwich residents.

Q: What are the three most important issues facing Greenwich voters today?

Q: Why are you running for RTM?


